





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01 INSURANCE & FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

How does my insurance impact my rebuilding options?

- Your policy may dictate coverage limits, rebuild cost reimbursements, and upgrade allowances.
 - It is important you get a <u>certified copy of</u> your full policy, read it, and understand

ASKAN ARCHITECT

What we are providing:

- Opportunities for in-person, virtual, or phone consultations.
- Summarized information from governmental agencies and departments.
- Answers to basic questions about the rebuilding process.
- Spanish-language support.

What is Phase II debris removal, and what does it cost?

Option 1 (Free of Charge):

Enroll in the government-managed and funded program (<u>Owner must submit</u> <u>Right of Entry "ROE" form providing US Army Corp of Engineering legal authority</u> <u>for entry</u> – beginning 01/28/25. **Deadline 03/31/25**)

Option 2 (Can be Costly):

Manage cleanup <u>independently through a private Licensed Contractor</u> (Requires Permit from LA County)

- Where do I start when rebuilding my home?
- 1. Review your insurance and financial options.
- 2. Determine your available funds and decide what you want to rebuild [like-for-like (faster) or new design (timelier)]
- Contact an Architect (preferable with local experience) to develop your ideas into drawings that meet current building code and fire resistance standards. An Architect can also assist with preliminary estimates based on your design.
- 4. Research Contractors, word of mouth and interview, at least three.
- 5. Your Architect can assist you with obtaining Building permits.
- 6. Select Contractor and begin construction (upon Phase II Debris Removal clearance).

Request a certified copy of your full policy.

<u>United Policyholders</u> is a free public resource for insurance questions (https://ushelp.org).

What if my insurance payout isn't enough to cover rebuilding costs?

If you have maxed out your insurance policy, you may qualify for disaster assistance programs, grants, or low-interest loans to supplement your rebuilding budget (https://lending.sba.gov/search-disaster/).

Work with a <u>public adjuster</u> who can work on your behalf to review your claim, negotiate with the insurance company, and potentially help you secure a better settlement.

Consider speaking to an Attorney experienced in Fire Insurance for additional support – they can help review your policy, challenge denied or underpaid claims, explore legal action if insurance is acting in bad faith.



ASKAN ARCHITECT

Summary as of 3/11:

- Launched on 2/21/25.
- We onboarded more than **105 architect volunteers** and provided training materials.

- We attended two in-person events spearheaded by SoCal NOMA and Sci-ARC and engaged with dozens of community members.





ROADMAP TO REBUILDING

This roadmap is intended to provide you with an outline of the steps to rebuilding. References are available to connect with city and county agencies as well as design and construction professionals who will help you along the way. Please refer to https://recovery.lacounty.gov/rebuilding/ for relevant links to city and county sites.

PLANNING



Take detailed photos and videos of affected areas. Keep a written record of DOCUMENT HOME everything. Collect existing documentation of the original structure including your full insurance policy, title, and any available drawings or surveys.

FOUNDATIONS REMOVE AS PART OF DEBRIS REMOVAL -or-REUSE Reusing Foundations will require testing to confirm viability.

OPTION 1: 110% REBUILD (LIKE-FOR-LIKE) Permit review process is expedited if new building is within 110% of the original building footprint, floor area, and height.

OPTION 2: NEW CONSTRUCTION Permitting review process will not be expedited but a larger structure than the original may be allowed.

DEBRIS REMOVAL



This is managed by the EPA and the State of California. Phase I is nearly complete.

RIGHT-OF-ENTRY & OPT-IN / OPT-OUT OPT-IN To allow Government provided Debris Removal by the Army Corp of Engineers. You are not charged for this service whether or not you have insurance. -or-OPT-OUT to Hire a Private Contractor for Debris Removal https://recovery.lacounty.gov/debris-removal/

Has already begun and will be completed in neighborhood goupings.

TREES MARKED FOR REMOVAL: If there are trees that are marked for removal that you would like to save, a sign may be posted to notify the Army Corp of Engineers. See AltadenaGreen.org for more information.

INSURANCE & FINANCING



If you don't have insurance, INSURANCE you may apply for Disaster Assistance and an SBA Low-Interest Disaster Loans or Grants.

The application for Individual Assistance through FEMA is due March MARCH EMA DEA 10th. This relief is intended to cover costs that may not be covered by your insurance.

INSURANCE COVERAGE CATEGORIES

Typical Coverage Categories may include:

LOSS OF USE which covers temporary housing PERSONAL PROPERTY which covers the loss of personal belongings. DEBRIS REMOVAL provides coverage for debris removal.

DWELLING & OTHER STRUCTURES Provides coverage for your home/ other structures that may have been included in your policy.

Once you understand what your insurance and disaster relief coverage looks like, you may also consider financing to cover the full cost of your rebuild. Meet with lenders to identify a financing structure that is best suited to you.

DESIGN & CONSTRUCTION



If you decide to rebuild, you DOCUMENTS NEEDED may need a survey and a soils report. Also, if you pursue a 110% rebuild, documentation subh as existing drawings, previous permit filings, aerial imagery, photos, videos, and LA County Assessor's data will be helpful.

This can begin when you are PLANNING DESIGN ready. Enlist the help of qualified and vetted design and construction professionals.

As part FIRE of rebuild planning, consider ONSIDER fire-resistant materials and design strategies.

REQUEST A
OST ESTIMATE
(ROM) A qualified contractor should be able to provide a preliminary cost estimate based on your design. This will help verify your budget.

Once the design documentation is completed, you may submit for permits.

approval requires the PERMIT PPROVA completion of the Phase II Debris Removal.
